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Kindergarten and First Grade

This year in Kinderaarten and 1st grade Library I have been using ideas gleaned from a workshop called "Integrating Performing Arts into the Early Childhood Classroom." One book I used these ideas with is Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day. We began with the Story Box-I gave them clues and the children guess the elements of the story I have hidden in the Story Box. It is an engaging way for the students to

make connections and get excited about the book.

The next week we read the book and assigned hand motions to the phrase that repeats throughout the book (same as the title). Then we talked about a bad day we have had and drew a picture of it.

The following week we reread parts of the story and discussed how Alexander's attitude made his day bad.

We read Phil. 4:8 "whatever is true,

noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy think about such things." We discussed how Alexander could have had a good attitude and a good day. The students drew a 2nd version of their picture from the previous week.

The students showed how a Godly attitude can make a bad day better.

Fifth and Sixth Grade

Students in fifth and sixth grade are involved in a study skills program called, You Can Take Charge. Each week they tackle topics that they can apply to help them become better students. Some topics they have covered are time management, organization, study tips, and test preparation.

Recently, they practiced evaluating print resources that will be used for a social studies research project. Not only is it important for students to have access to library resources, it is also necessary for students to be able to recognize whether or not a resource is credible or suitable to their needs.
