## WALK HIS WAY

A Note from the Head of School, Mr. Tom Hughes

As members of the administration team at Eden Christian Academy discussed what verse and theme would be most fitting for the upcoming year, the focus was on more than just our students, it was on our faculty, staff, and parents. It wasn't long before the decision was made: Isaiah 30:21.

Isaiah 30:21 urges us to listen intently for God's voice and allow Him to take the lead; it is God, and He alone, who truly knows the path best suited for us. Did He not warn the leaders of Jerusalem and Judah through Isaiah about their poor choices and the ensuing consequences should they continue down that path?

The voices our students hear come from numerous directions: God, parents, teachers, coaches, youth leaders, the media, as well as from their peers. And, the voices do not necessarily come in that order. They may come from the front of the classroom, from the sidelines, from the neighborhood, or from behind, similar to a parent teaching a child how to ride a bike for the first time. The point is students will hear voices offering countless opinions.

As followers of Christ, we are called to listen for His voice. Deciphering whether or not it is God's voice can be unclear at times. It begs the question, "How do we really know when God is speaking to us?" This question must first be addressed by reading His Word faithfully and then checking His Word with those voices. Next, we must have faith that the voice we hear is from God and understand that He cares deeply about our every decision.

Throughout this school year, our commitment to parents is that we will help their children understand that God cares abundantly for their welfare, and He is constantly offering perfect instructions for His children. It is truly remarkable to observe how this plays out in and out of the classroom. In conversations with a few individuals, I found their insight to Isaiah 30:21 most encouraging:

"Stay focused on God, knowing that there will be times when you'll be tempted to pull away. Stay focused on Him." -Eden Parent

After spending almost six years at Eden, Sarah moved ten hours away to Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tennessee where she is currently completing her junior year. "I have had so many great opportunities living in Nashville," she shares. Sarah is majoring in marketing with a concentration in entrepreneurship. "I love the creative side of business," she explains. She dreams of owning an event planning company in the future as well as living abroad for some time and supporting organizations that combat human trafficking. untimely obstacle into an opportunity for new friendships. In the midst of surgery and physical therapy, Sarah was able to power through her first semester and develop relationships along the way. The ordeal even gave her the chance to become good friends with a freshman who helped her on the day of the accident. "All throughout those first few months...I experienced the love of Christ all around me in the people I met," she shares.

While in Nashville, you might find Sarah meeting with her sorority, Phi Sigma, or the "I Am Second" Team, interning at a non-profit organization called Survival Fitness, working at her university's Career Development Center or, of course, studying. Her boundaries stretch much farther than the college's campus, however. Recently, she embarked on a mission trip to the Baja Peninsula in San Quintin, Mexico where she ran a Vacation Bible School and built a house, "The people there changed my life and heart forever," she reflects. Later, in May 2015, she studied abroad in London, taking business classes and touring major European companies. "Some of the best things about living in London were getting to experience the culture, attending an Evensong Service at Westminster

Abbey, and riding the Tube," she says. She is spending the current semester in Pittsburgh, working full time and volunteering as the middle school ministry leader in her church.

Sarah's action and service-oriented attitude flourished at Eden where she participated in a multitude of activities, including student council, National Honor Society, the speech team, sports, and choreographing the musical. # ECA SENIOR RECOGNIZED

Mason Zadan published in Harvard's Journal of Emerging Investigators



ECA senior, Mason Zadan, was recently recognized by a publication at one of the nation's most prestigious institutions: Harvard University. Mason's study, "Comparative Gamma Radiation Analysis by Geographic Region" was published in Harvard's Journal of Emerging Investigators (JEI). JEI is a national online journal for high school students with a staff of 200 graduate and postdoctoral students from around the country that are dedicated to publishing high school students' research. Mason began his research during his freshman Biology class where he started with radiation levels around the Pittsburgh area. He then expanded his research using a Geiger counter that he used to collect data from six countries and six states. In total, Mason collected more than 230 points. Using statistical tests, he cross referenced radiation levels with factors such as cancer rates, elevation, and proximity to the nearest nuclear power plants. Mason submitted his research and after a year of revisions was honored to be included in the JEI publication. Congratulations to Mason on his outstanding achievements. There's always something exciting about anything new. Whether it's a shiny bike, a sweater, or the latest iPhone, people are drawn to the feeling of newness. In 2014, Eden Christian Academy announced an expansion project that would build a brand new addition to the Mt. Nebo Campus.

The new building will be located in the area to the right of the administrative building. The addition will be three stories high and will add nine new classrooms, two state-of-the-art science labs, a cafeteria, a student-run store, and a media center to the campus. It will solve Mt. Nebo's perpetual problem of overcrowded hallways and will make the campus more visually appealing. It will also help create a separation between the middle school and the high school.

As of October 5, 2015, the building's pledges have totaled at 1.6 million dollars. The goal is to complete all three floors provided the money is available. When the building is constructed, the first two floors will be completely finished, but the third floor will remain partially unfinished. Mr. Tom Hughes would love to see the Eden body support this project through prayers and "seeking God's counsel on how they might become involved in this project."

It is hoped that they will break ground in January 2016. Construction of the building will take roughly nine to ten months; although this estimation may change due to weather conditions. The new building will help the school immensely and has already earned its spot in building a legacy for Eden Christian Academy's students and families.


